PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP DESCRIPTIONS

1) Workshop Name: An Overview of the New World Screwworm and Its Potential Impact to Texas ^*

Sonja L. Swiger, PhD, T.R. Lansford, III, D.V.M., and David Sessum, LVT, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension

The workshop will explain what the New World screwworm is and the potential concerns and impact it will have on Texas, Texans, and all the animals that live in Texas. The re-emergence of the New World screwworm poses a \$2 billion impact on the Texas livestock economy and requires the cooperation of all Texans to prevent its return and, if it does, to eradicate it.

2) Workshop Name: Farming Is Risky Business: Teaching Risk Through Real-World Decisions ^-

Aubrienne Meek and Brett Crosby- Custom Ag Solutions

Farming Is Risky Business (FRB) is an interactive workshop that teaches students core agricultural risk management concepts through real-world decision-making. Participants experience how price risk, production risk, and crop insurance impact farm profitability using a competitive, game-based simulation that is easy to implement in the classroom.
